Alexis Schaitkin


Richly emotive and darkly captivating, with elements of Shirley Jackson's "The Lottery," and the imaginative depth of Margaret Atwood, *Elsewhere* by Alexis Schaitkin conjures a community in which girls become wives, wives become mothers and some of them, quite simply, disappear.

Vera grows up in a small town, removed and isolated, pressed up against the mountains, cloud-covered and damp year-round. This town, fiercely protective, brutal and unforgiving in its adherence to tradition, faces a singular affliction: some mothers vanish from their families. It is the exquisite pain and intrinsic beauty of their lives; it sets them apart from people elsewhere and gives them meaning.

Vera, a young girl when her own mother went, is on the cusp of adulthood herself. As her peers begin to marry and become mothers, they speculate about who might be the first to go, each wondering about her own fate. Reveling in their gossip, they witness each other in motherhood, waiting for signs: this one devotes herself to her child too much, this one not enough—that must surely draw the affliction's gaze. When motherhood comes for Vera, she is faced with the question: will she be able to stay and mother her beloved child, or will she go?

Provocative and hypnotic, Alexis Schaitkin's *Elsewhere* is at once a spellbinding revelation and a rumination on the mysterious task of motherhood and all the ways in which a woman can lose herself to it; the self-monitoring and judgment, the doubts and unknowns, and the legacy she leaves behind.

Alexis Schaitkin is the author of *Saint X*. Her short stories have been anthologized in *The Best American Short Stories* and *The Best American Nonrequired Reading*. She received her MFA in fiction from the University of Virginia, where she was a Henry Hoyns Fellow. She lives in Williamstown, Massachusetts, with her husband and son.

The Latecomer

Jean Hanff Korelitz

The Oppenheimer triplets have been reared with every advantage: wealth, education, and the determined attention of at least one of their parents. But neither Harrison (the smart one), Lewyn (the weird one) nor Sally (the girl) suspects the devastating event that set their family in motion, or understands how fully it has already formed them.

Now, on the verge of their departure for college and desperate to escape one another at last, the triplets are forced to contend with an unexpected complication: a fourth Oppenheimer sibling, formerly a leftover embryo from their own long ago in vitro genesis, has just been born. What has possessed their parents to make such an unfathomable decision? How can the triplets begin to imagine the impact this unwanted latecomer will have on their lives, and the ways she will work to bring them home?

The Latecomer is a tender and witty family story from an accomplished author, known for the depth of her character studies and her love of a plot twist.

Bad City Peril and Power in the City of Angels

Paul Pringle

For fans of Spotlight and *Bad Blood* comes a journalistic thriller about corruption and betrayal at two of Los Angeles's most powerful institutions--USC and *The LA Times*--from a Pulitzer-prize winning reporter who investigated the story and helped bring justice in the face of formidable odds.

In 2016, a salacious tip came into *The LA Times*' newsroom that journalist Paul Pringle thought would, at most, take a few weeks to check out: a minor drug incident at a fancy hotel involving one of the University of Southern California's shiniest stars--Dr. Carmen Puliafito, the venerated head of the prestigious medical school. Pringle, who'd long done battle with USC and its almost impenetrable culture of silence, knew reporting the story wouldn't be a walk in the park. USC is the largest private employer in LA and it casts a long shadow.

But what he couldn't have foreseen then was that this tip would lead to the unveiling of not one major scandal at USC but two, wrapped in a web of crimes and cover-ups. The rot rooted out by Pringle and his colleagues at *The Times* crept closer to home than they could have imagined: all the way to the top of the paper's masthead. After the editors killed the initial story, Paul and his colleagues defied their bosses and quietly assembled a reporting team, risking their careers to continue their work and expose the underbelly of both USC and *The Times*.

Ultimately a story of investigative journalism winning the day, Pringle's tale of how he and his fellow reporters triumphed over the city's debased institutions reads like John Carreyrou with the grit of an LA noir thriller. This is LA at its darkest and investigative journalism at its brightest.

Paul Pringle is a *Los Angeles Times* reporter who specializes in investigating corruption. In 2019, he and two colleagues won the Pulitzer Prize for Investigative Reporting for the investigations that exposed Dr. George Tyndall at the University of Southern California, a probe that grew out of their reporting the year before on Dr. Carmen Puliafito, dean of USC's medical school. He was a Pulitzer Prize finalist in 2009 and a member of reporting teams that won Pulitzer Prizes in 2004 and 2011. Pringle won the George Polk Award in 2008, the same year the Society of Professional Journalists of Greater Los Angeles honored him as a distinguished journalist. In 2012, he shared in Harvard University's Worth Bingham Prize for Investigative Reporting. Pri...

The Kingdoms of Savannah A Novel

When matriarch Morgana Musgrove calls upon her prodigal son Ransom to help her with a case, the defunct M. Musgrove & Family Detective Agency is back in business, albeit reluctantly. Tensions rise between the Musgroves as Morgana's granddaughter, Jaq, becomes entangled in the case. Whispers of a mysterious lost "Kingdom"—a community of descendants of the African-American soldiers who fought for King George in the Revolutionary War, and afterwards formed a secret community, refusing to return to slavery—float in the sultry Savannah night. The family of investigators creeps closer and closer to exposing the city's seedy underbelly, and a depraved history that a powerful few are determined to keep hidden, no matter the cost…

The Kingdom of Savannah is a return to Green's roots as a sophisticated, atmospheric suspense novelist, whose deeply human characters draw us into their world from the very first page.

George Dawes Green, founder of The Moth and Unchained, is an internationally celebrated author. His first novel, *The Caveman's Valentine*, won the Edgar Award and became a motion picture starring Samuel L. Jackson. *The Juror* was an international bestseller in more than twenty languages and was the basis for the movie starring Demi Moore and Alec Baldwin. *Ravens* was chosen as one of the best books of 2009 by the *Los Angeles Times*, the *Wall Street Journal*, the *Daily Mail* of London, and many other publications. George Green grew up in Georgia and now lives in Brooklyn, New York.

The Viral Underclass How Racism, Ableism, and Capitalism Plague Humans on the Margins

Steven W. Thrasher

From preeminent LGBTQ scholar and journalist Steven Thrasher comes an exploration of one of the most pressing issues of our times: the relationship between viruses and inequality.

In March 2020, the COVID pandemic plunged the world into fear and chaos. People around the globe locked themselves in their houses and stocked up on food, fearing unemployment, the loss of loved ones, and an uncertain future. But as the weeks went on, one devastating truth began to emerge more prominently than any other: we were not all impacted by this virus the same way. While wealthier people could keep themselves safe by working from home and using food delivery, the marginalized members of society were left much more vulnerable. They held risky jobs as "Essential Workers,"; they did not have health insurance; they lost employment and the ability to afford housing and food; they were old and viewed as disposable; they were undocumented and afraid to go to the hospital; they were at far greater risk because of living with a disability. It quickly became startlingly clear the vast inequalities in who was able to survive the virus.

And yet for prominent scholar Steven Thrasher, none of this was a surprise. Having spent his ground-breaking career studying the racialization, policing, and criminalization of HIV, Dr. Thrasher had seen first hand how viruses intersect with racism, capitalism, homophobia, and ableism. He knew that the ways in which viruses spread, kill, and take their toll are much more dependent on social structures than they are on biology. And he had a term for it: the viral underclass.

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STEVEN W. THRASHER, PHD holds the inaugural Daniel H. Renberg chair at Northwestern University, the first journalism professorship in the world created to focus on LGBTQ research. He is also a faculty member of Northwestern's Institute of Sexual and Gender Minority Health and Wellbeing. A columnist for Scientific American, his writing has been widely published by *The New York Times, Nation, Atlantic, Journal of American History, BuzzFeed News, Esquire* and *New York.* In 2019, *Out* magazine named him one of the 100 most influential and impactful people of the year and in 2020, the Ford Foundation awarded him a grant for Creativity and



Last Call A True Story of Love, Lust, and Murder in Queer New York

Now in paperback, the gripping true story of the Last Call Killer and the gay community of New York City that he preyed upon.

The Townhouse Bar, midtown, July 1992: The piano player seems to know every song ever written, the crowd belts out the lyrics to their favorites, and a man standing nearby is drinking a Scotch and water. The man strikes the piano player as forgettable.

He looks bland and inconspicuous. Not at all what you think a serial killer looks like. But that's what he is, and tonight, he has his sights set on a gray haired man. He will not be his first victim. Nor will he be his last.

The Last Call Killer preyed upon gay men in New York in the '80s and '90s and had all the hallmarks of the most notorious serial killers. Yet because of the sexuality of his victims, the skyhigh murder rates, and the AIDS epidemic, his murders have been almost entirely forgotten.

This gripping true-crime narrative tells the story of the Last Call Killer and the decades-long chase to find him. And at the same time, it paints a portrait of his victims and a vibrant community navigating threat and resilience.

Elon Green has written for *The New York Times Magazine*, *The Atlantic*, *The New Yorker*, and *The Columbia Journalism Review*, and appears in Sarah Weinman's forthcoming anthology of true crime. He has been an editor at Longform for nearly a decade. He lives in Port Washington, New York.

When twenty-nine-year-old Sunday Brennan wakes up in a Los Angeles hospital, bruised and battered after a drunk driving accident she caused, she swallows her pride and goes home to her family in New York. But it's not easy. She deserted them all—and her high school sweetheart—five years before with little explanation, and they've got questions.

Sunday is determined to rebuild her life back on the east coast, even if it does mean tiptoeing around resentful brothers and an ex-fiancé. The longer she stays, however, the more she realizes they need her just as much as she needs them. When a dangerous man from her past brings her family's pub business to the brink of financial ruin, the only way to protect them is to upend all their secrets—secrets that have damaged the family for generations and will threaten everything they know about their lives. In the aftermath, the Brennan family is forced to confront painful mistakes—and ultimately find a way forward, together.

Born in the Bronx and raised in Manhattan, **Tracey Lange** comes from a large Irish family with a few secrets of its own. She headed west and graduated from the University of New Mexico before owning and operating a behavioral healthcare company with her husband for fifteen years. While writing her debut novel, *We Are the Brennans*, she completed the Stanford University online novel writing program. Tracey currently lives in Bend, Oregon, with her husband, two sons and their German Shepherd.

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
